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Catalog Description:

Definition and examples of community service in education; importance of community service; development and assessment of community service; identifying and preparing projects to solve the current issues and problems of the society; voluntary participation in social responsibility projects; participation in scientific activities.

Community, community service, service practices and social responsibility concepts; social responsibility projects in terms of social and cultural values; identifying current social problems; designing service projects for the solution of social problems; voluntarily participating in individual and group social responsibility projects; participating in social responsibility projects in various institutions and organizations; participating in scientific events such as panels, conferences, congresses, symposiums as speakers or regulators; assessing the results of social responsibility projects.

- a. Plagiarism is a form of dishonesty that occurs when a person passes off someone else's work as his or her own. This can range from failing to cite an author for ideas incorporated into a student's paper to cutting and pasting paragraphs from different websites to handing in a paper downloaded from internet. All are plagiarism.
- b. All parties to plagiarism are considered equally guilty. If you share your coursework with another student and she plagiarizes it, you are considered as guilty as the one who has plagiarized your work, since you enabled the plagiarism to take place. Under no circumstances should a student make his/her coursework available to another student unless the instructor gives explicit permission for this to happen. Copying someone's work is an extreme and straightforward act of plagiarism. More commonly, however, students plagiarize without realizing they are doing so. This generally happens when a student fails to acknowledge the source of an idea or phrasing. Avoid plagiarism by citing sources properly!

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

Reflection Reports (20%): During the semester we will have two guest speakers in our class. The reasons for having those speakers with are to enhance your understanding about examples of community service in education, importance of community services, identifying and preparing projects to solve the current issues and problems of the society. voluntary participation in social responsibility projects.

Project proposal (30%): You should introduce as the first stage of the project into form of project proposals for implementation. You first of all ask 'Where do ideas for projects come from?' and then consider the methods of turning good ideas into projects. We introduce a number of established tools and models for developing and testing ideas in different areas of community services specifically, and address the question of how to get support for your project ideas. Projects generally emerge from the combination of an organisational need—to solve a problem or take up an opportunity—and a good idea about how to meet that need. In your research you found that indeed good ideas for projects arose everywhere, and that the process of emergence and capture of good ideas varies with the size and nature of the organisation and its approach to innovation and development. So you develop a written plan that includes goals and objectives, time frame, and people and resources needed and project proposal template will be given.

Project report/bulletin (20%): After/when you get to put your plan into action, you start to write project report. Remember this is a group effort. Everyone in the group should know his/her responsibilities. In the first part of the project report; you will add revised form of proposal at the beginning of your report. In the second part; preparation and planning activities will be explained. In the third part; your implementations of the action plan, evidence of what you monitored and adjusted during the action plan will be discussed. In the fourth part yours' reflections to increase understanding of self and others by describing what happened, expressing feelings, generating ideas, making connections with your existing knowledge will be discussed.

Poster presentation (30%): At the end of the semester, each group will prepare a poster to present his/ her community projects to class and faculty members. In the poster; project goals, action plan, implementation of the action plan, discussions about improvement of the project will be placed.
